

## CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS OF THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF AGENCIES ON DEAFNESS, INC.

#### Article I Name and Offices

Section 1. Name. This corporation shall be known and designated by the name "National Council of Agencies on Deafness, Inc." hereinafter referred to as the "National Council".

Section 2. Place of Corporation. The National Council shall be incorporated as a non-profit corporation under the laws of one of the several states of the United States.

Section 3. Offices. The National Council shall maintain its central office.

#### Article II Purposes and Objectives

For the purposes of this Constitution and Bylaws, "hearing impairment" is a generic term indicating a hearing disability which may range in severity from mild to profound, including the subsets of deaf and hard of hearing.

- Section 1. Improvement of Services. The purposes and objectives for which the National Council is established and operated are:
- A. To provide a specialized forum for administrators of member agencies to study, deliberate, and act upon matters affecting human services and other services to hearing impaired persons.
- B. To provide a resource for the formulation and expression of the collective points of view of member agencies on all issues affecting the provision of human services and other services to hearing impaired persons.
- C. To serve as an advisory body to and to establish and maintain liaison with federal agencies as they develop policies and administer programs affecting services to hearing impaired persons.
- D. To serve as an advisory body to voluntary agencies on matters pertaining to human services and other services to hearing impaired persons
- E. To encourage, sponsor, or conduct research and/or demonstrations, which can reasonably be expected to lead to improvement in programs and services to hearing impaired persons

#### ARTICLE II Purposes and Objectives (Continued)

- F. To inform the public of the ability and capacity of persons who are deaf or hearing impaired; of the benefits to society derived through the provision of human services and other services to hearing impaired persons; and to otherwise promote their social and economic independence.
- G. To advocate nationally on a planned basis, the improvement of programs and services to hearing impaired persons.

#### ARTICLE III Membership

- Section 1. Eligibility. State government or non-profit private agencies whose established primary function focuses on the provision of human services affecting hearing impaired citizens are eligible for membership in the National Council. Such human services may include advocacy, information and referral, interpreting services, TDD message relay, deafness workshops, technical assistance.
- Section 2. <u>Perfection of Membership.</u> Membership in the National Council is perfected by an eligible agency through its payment of such annual dues as may from time to time be established and by the agency's commitment to uphold and to advance the National Council's purposes and objectives as set forth in Article II
- Section 3. Representation of Member Agencies. The "Agency Administrator" shall be entitled to represent the member agency in the National Council and to cast a single vote of the member agency. The Agency Administrator shall enjoy full privileges of participation in all meetings and other activities of the National Council. When the Agency Administrator is unable per- sonally to represent the agency on or before the National Council, he shall have the right to designate a subordinate from within the agency to represent the agency, who shall enjoy the full rights and privileges of the Agency Administrator except for the purpose of serving as an officer.
- Section 4. Application for Membership. Applications for initial membership in the National Council may be made by letter from the Agency Administrator thought to be eligible for membership in the National Council. Such letter shall be directed to the Secre- tary/Treasurer of the National Council, and in the event of any question on the part of the Secretary/Treasurer as to the applicant's eligibility for membership, the question of eligibility shall be referred to the Executive Committee for determination. Once eligibility and membership have been established, the Secretary/Treasurer thereafter shall bill the agency for annual dues, and membership shall be continued through payment of dues.

#### ARTICLE III Membership (Continued)

Section 5. Changes Respecting Member Agencies. In the event of any significant change in the services of a member agency or in the event of a change of its Agency Administrator, it shall be the duty of the member agency to notify a member of the Executive Committee of such change, as well as of changes of address and related matters.

#### ARTICLE IV Membership Dues

Section 1. <u>Payment Required</u>. Membership dues in the National Council shall be set by the membership on recommendation of the Executive Committee, and the payment of such dues shall be a condition precedent to the right to vote.

Section 2. <u>Time and Payment.</u> Regular dues shall be payable for the calendar year, which calendar year shall also constitute the National Council's fiscal year. Dues for each fiscal year must be paid on or before March 31, in order for the member agency to retain its right to vote for the balance of the fiscal year.

#### ARTICLE V Meetings

- Section 1. Regular Membership Meetings. The National Council shall hold one biennial meeting. The place of all regular meetings of the National Council shall be fixed by a majority vote of the membership, or the membership shall authorize the Executive Committee to select the place.
- Section 2. Special Membership Meetings. Such meetings of the National Council may be called by the President with the approval of the majority of the Executive Committee. The place of the special meeting shall be determined by the Executive Committee.
- Section 3. Notice of Membership Meetings. Notice of all meetings shall be given at least ninety days prior to the meeting by mailing a tentative agenda to each member agency at its last known address.
- Section 4. Meetings of the Executive Committee. At least thirty (30) days notice of all meetings of the Executive Committee shall be given by the President. When time does not permit such notice, the Executive Committee may conduct a meeting by means of a telephone conference call in order to deal with matters deserving the immediate attention of the Executive Committee provided that a quorum participates in the telephone conference and minutes of such telephone conferences are taken, preserved, and distributed to the membership.

#### ARTICLE V Meetings (Continued)

- Section 5. Quorum. (a) A quorum of all meetings shall consist of 50 percent of the members attending the meeting. The term "member in good standing" means a member agency whose dues have been paid as provided for in Article IV. (b) A quorum at all meetings of the Executive Committee shall consist of a majority of the members of the Committee.
- Section 6. Minutes. Minutes of all meetings of the membership and of the Executive Committee shall be taken, preserved, and distributed to all member agencies.
- Section 7. Rules of Order. Meetings shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of the latest edition of Robert's Rules of Order, except that if any requirements of Robert's Rules of Order is in conflict with a provision of the Constitution and Bylaws of the National Council, the Constitution and Bylaws shall prevail.

#### ARTICLE VI Administration

- Section 1. Executive Committee. The interim affairs of the National Council shall be conducted by an Executive Committee which shall consist of the officers of the National Council.
- Section 2. Powers and Duties. The powers and duties of the Executive Committee shall include:
- A. Entering into agreements with other organizations, when such agreements will facilitate the attainment of the purposes and objectives of the National Council.
- ${\tt B.}$  Adopting a budget and establishing policies for disbursing and accounting for funds.
- C. Making arrangements for meetings of the National Council. The President may appoint a program committee, consisting of one or more members, which shall be responsible for developing the agenda and completing arrangements for such meetings as authorized or directed by the Executive Committee.
- D. Hearing and acting on reports of all committees.
- E. Authorizing the appointment of special committees.
- F. Acting upon nominations of the chairperson for committee assignments.
- G. Appointing a committee to nominate officers.
- H. Assigning functions and duties to members of the National Council.

#### ARTICLE VI Administration (Continued)

- Promulgating regulations needed to carry out the purposes of the National Council and performing such other duties as are usually expected of executive bodies, and
- J. Reporting to the National Council on its activities.
- Section 3. Prohibitions. The Executive Committee is prohibited from:
- A. Undertaking financial commitments for the obligation or expenditure of funds exceeding the available unobligated resources of the National Council.
- B. Obligating future Executive Committees in undertakings unless the successor Executive Committees or committees has the right to review and ratify or resoind such undertaking.

Section 4. Officers Duties. The officers of the National Council, who shall also serve as officers of the Executive Committee, shall consist of the following:

#### A. The President

The duties of the president as the Chief Executive Officer shall include presiding over the meetings of the National Council and its Executive Committee; nominating to the Executive Committee, within thirty (30) days of the assumption of office, members to fill all vacancies on committees; supervising the work of committees; and representing the Council wherever such official representation is needed.

#### B. The Vice-president

The duties of the Vice-president shall be to perform the duties of the president when the president is unable to do so, and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned by the Executive Committee. The Vice-president chairs the biennial meeting of the National Council.

#### C. The Secretary/Treasurer

The duties of the Secretary/Treasurer shall be to serve as the custodian of all records, including financial accounts and records of the National Council, and for transferring such records to his successor. The Secretary/Treasurer shall be responsible for taking, preserving, and distributing minutes of all proceedings of the National Council or its Executive Committee to the membership on a timely basis. If the Secretary/

Treasurer is unable to discharge all of his duties and responsibilities, he may designate a member of his staff to assist him. In the event that he or his assistant is unable to attend meetings of the National Council or of the Executive Committee,

#### ARTICLE VI Administration (Continued)

#### C. The Secretary/Treasurer (continued)

he may designate some other member representative to fulfill the responsibilities and take and distribute minutes of the proceedings, or in the absence thereof, the president shall, before proceeding with any other business, appoint a temporary recording secretary for that purpose unless the services of a public or legal stenographer has been authorized and engaged for that purpose as herein provided.

The Secretary/Treasurer shall be responsible for preparation and submitting a budget to the Executive Committee for approval. He shall be responsible for billing and collecting dues from member agencies; for disbursing and accounting for the funds of the National Council in accordance with its established policies and procedures; and for the investment of National Council funds in accordance with directives of the Executive Committee. He shall make the financial records and books of the National Council available for inspection by any person serving as a representative to the National Council. Reports describing all financial transactions shall be made to the membership at regular meetings, and there shall be at least one annual and comprehensive Financial Report to the members. He shall perform such other duties as may be assigned by the Executive Committee.

Section 5. Order of Succession. Whenever a vacancy exists in the office of the president, he shall be succeeded in office by an elected officer of the National Council in the order in which the officers appear in Section 4, Article VI.

Section 6. Vacancies. Any vacancy in any office other than the office of president because of succession, death, resignation, removal, disqualification or otherwise, shall be filled by election at any meeting of the members by a majority vote of those present and voting thereon. Only those casting an affirmative or negative vote shall be considered as voting thereon. Nominations shall be from the floor.

The president may, in his discretion appoint an "Agency Admin-istrator" to fill an exiting vacancy in an elective office.

Such "Agency Administrator" shall serve as an officer until any election can be held at the next successive regular meeting of the membership.

Section 7. Removal of Officers. Any officer of the National Council may be removed by the Executive Committee whenever, in its judgement, the best interests of the National Council would be served thereby. Notice of such removal shall be given to the members and the action shall be subject to review and ratification or repeal by the full membership, acting in a regular meeting or through mail ballot, if writing by at least five (5

#### ARTICLE VI Administration (Continued)

Section 8. <u>Compensation</u>. The individuals elected to the office described in Section 4 of Article VI of these Bylaws shall serve without compensation or remuneration, except that of expenses actually incurred in carrying out official responsibilities, in accordance with policies and procedures of the National Council.

Section 9. Other Staff or Officers. The Executive Committee may from time to time secure clerical, technical, legal, or other professional services deemed necessary for more effectively

accomplishing the purposes and objectives described in Article II.

Such services may be obtained on such terms and conditions as appear necessary and prudent.

Section 10. Terms of Officers. The term of all elective officers of the National Council shall be for a period of two years. The term of office shall commence immediately following the biennial election of officers. An individual may, however, be re-elected for any successive number of terms of office.

Section 11. Ratification. Any and all actions of the Executive Committee may be reviewed and ratified, disaffirmed or resoinded in whole or in part at any subsequent meeting of the members by a majority vote of those present and voting thereon. Only those casting an affirmative or negative vote shall be considered as voting thereon.

#### ARTICLE VII Committees

Section 1. Standing Committees. The Executive Committee shall from time to time establish such standing committees as may be deemed necessary. The president shall make and submit nomina- tions for committee assignments to the Executive Committee for approval.

Section 2. Special Committees. When special committees have been authorized by the Executive Committee, the president shall nominate and submit special committee assignments to the Executive Committee for approval.

Section 3. Eligibility. In order for an individual to serve on any special committee of the National Council, it is not a condition of eligibility that the individual also serve as a member's official representative to the National Council. The practice of encouraging other individuals from member agencies to participate in the committee work of the National Council will be favored. Special committees may from time to time be established with a view toward obtaining judgement and expertise from individuals not associated with any agency qualified for membership in the National Council.

Section 4. Executive Committee Approval. An Executive Committee approval of committee assignments may be accomplished by mail or at any meeting of the Executive Committee provided for herein.

#### ARTICLE VIII Elections

Section 1. Biennial Elections. At the regular meeting of the membership of the National Council on the even numbereded years, the following officers shall be elected:

- A. President
- B. Vice-president
- C. Secretary/Treasurer
- D. Three trustees representing state government agencies (commissions, councils, depts. divisions etc. )
- E. Three trustees representing non-profit private agencies.

Section 2. Eligibility. Any "Agency Administrator" representing a member agency in good standing shall be eligible to hold office in the National

Section 3. Conduct of Election. As the final order of business prior to adjournment, the president shall call for nominations from the floor and after the nominations for each office have closed, the election for that office shall ensue, and a majority of those present and casting an affirmative or negative vote shall be required for successful election to office. Voting may be by secret ballot or by roll call vote as the membership present and attending may determine.

#### ARTICLE IX Amendments

Section 1. Notice. These Bylaws and the Articles of Incorporation of the National Council of Agencies on Deafness may only be amended or altered at a meeting of the membership, but notice of any proposed amendment to these Bylaws or Articles of Incorporation shall have been mailed to each member of the National Council at least sixty (60) days prior to the meeting at which any amendments are to be considered. The requirement of notice, may however, be waived by the consent of four-fifth (4/5) of the members present at any meeting. In order for any amendment to be made under this section to these Bylaws, such amendment shall require an affirmative vote by two-thirds (2/3) of those present and voting at the meeting at which the amend- ment is considered.

#### ARTICLE X Dissolution

The assets of the National Council shall be used only for such purposes as are herein prescribed, and under no condition shall such assets be used to influence legislation in any way. No income of the National Council shall incur to any individual. If the National Council should be dissolved, its remaining assets shall be disbursed to a non-profit organization serving hearing impaired under the Internal Revenue Service Law (1954-Tax Exempt Status 501-C-3) as determined by the last Executive Board.

Historical Note: The National Council of State Agencies on Deafness at its regular meeting on June 21, 1983, adopted and ratified this Constitution and Bylaws. The ratification was supported by mail vote of the membership. It was revised on 7/3/84 Baltimore, MD. It was revised again by mail vote on May 22, 1987 to extend membership to non-profit service agencies and to change its name to the National Council of Agencies on Deafness.

## REGULAR MEETING FIRST NATIONAL CONFERENCE OF THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF AGENCIES ON DEAFNESS AUSTIN, TEXAS, APRIL 8, 1988 8:30 a.m.

Bill Peace, State Administrator of the North Carolina Council for the Hearing Impaired, serving as Chairman, welcomed those in attendance and discussed the background of the organization and the expansion of the Council to include non-profit community service agencies. He stated that he and others had made every effort to keep the organization alive even though some plans had not been followed through. He further stated that during the last two years, work was mostly confined to planning the First National Conference with Larry Evans, Executive Director of the Texas Commission for the Deaf. He then recognized Larry Evans and expressed his appreciation on behalf of the attendees for the work done to make the conference successful.

Bill Peace then recognized Chris Hunter, Executive Director of the Michigan Division of the Deaf and Deafened to take over the Chair to lead discussion on some changes that were needed in the ByLaws. Chris Hunter explained that the Council ByLaws presently provided for sixteen (16) votes and dues were established at \$50 per year. Discussion related to

these dues and membership issues resulted in the following motions:

Joel Ziev: Establish dues of fifty dollars (\$50) for agencies of less than ten (10) Full Time Employees and one hundred (\$100) for agencies with ten (10) or more FTL, Second by Peggy Schmidt and passed.

Peggy Schmidt: The Executive Committee be expanded by adding two members-at-large: one representing non-profit agencies to be elected by those agencies, and one representative of state agencies to be elected by those agencies. Seconded by <u>Larry Evans</u> and <u>passed</u> by required 2/3 votes.

A discussion on affiliation with another organization included a presentation by Gloria Kemp, President of the American Deafness and Rehabilitation Association (ADARA). Discussion resulted in the following motions:

Robert Geesey: That the Executive Committee negotiate with ADARA on affiliation. Seconded by Bill Rogers and passed.

Larry Evans: NCAD be created as an independent organization. Seconded by Joel Ziev and passed.

Next, discussion returned to the makeup of the Executive Committee. Opinions were expressed that the Executive Committee should be expanded and represent the total membership. The following motions were made to amend previous motions passed earlier in the meeting:

<u>Dana Leonard</u>: To reconsider the motion of expanding the Executive Committee to five (5) members. Seconded by Steve Larew but denied. April 8, 1988 minutes page 2

<u>Joel Ziev</u>: Change composition of Executive Board from two (2) members-at-large to six (6) members-at-large. Seconded by <u>Bill Peace</u> and passed by required 2/3 vote.

Robert Geesey: Amend the amendment to read that three of the at-large members represent non-profit agencies and three of the at-large members represent state agencies. Seconded by Lil Browning and passed by required 2/3 vote.

Further discussion of the Council's ByLaws resulted in the following motion:

<u>David Rosenthal</u>: Create a Standing Committee to study the Constitution and ByLaws and make recommendations for improvement and changes to be submitted to the Executive Board for review and submission to the members at least 60 days prior to the next convention for ratification. Seconded by Gerald Nelson and passed.

<u>Joel Ziev</u>: Change title of President to President and Chief Executive Officer (CEO). Seconded by <u>Lil Browning</u> and <u>passed</u>.

Peggy Schmidt: Meet in even years. Seconded by Robert Geesey and passed.

At this point, Bill Peace reclaimed the Chair.

Next, nominations were made for the officers: President and CEO, Vice President and Secretary. Because nominations closed with only one nominee for each position, the following motion was necessary:

Larry Evans: That the Secretary cast a ballot and certify the officers.
Seconded by Steve Larew and passed.

The following were thus elected:

Chris Hunter - President and CEO Larry Evans - Vice President Bob Geesey - Secretary

Election was then held for the at-Large positions on the Board with the following results:

State Agency Members of Board: Bill Peace Peggy Schmidt Dana Leonard

Non-Profit Agency Members of Board: Gerald Nelson Joel Ziev Bruce Weir

Lil Browning recommended that the Board investigate a way to connect with the El Paso Conference scheduled in September, 1988 to enable NCAD to make input and get some visibility. She also requested

the secretary's address and that a letter could be sent to all on the list of convention names.

Discussion was held on plans for the next Convention, to be held in 1990. Three bids were submitted to host the Convention:

- 1. Robert Geesey for Spokane, Washington.
- 2. Bill Rogers for Louisville, Kentucky.
- 3. Gerald Nelson for Washington, D.C.

Brief presentations were made for all three. A vote was taken and Louisville, KY was decided on. Bill Rogers told the Convention that April or May would be the best time, before or after the Derby. Louisville is centrally located and easily accessible by most all major airlines.

Bill Peace again thanked TCD making the conference a success. Speaking of the financial success of the conference, he stated that while there were a few bills to be paid, we should have \$1500 - \$1800 left over.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 11:05 a.m.

#### Dear Colleague:

Enclosed you will find information about the National Council of Agencies on Deafness (NCAD). NCAD is a fairly new organization designed for and comprised of administrators of state commissions on deafness and non-profit (community service) agencies serving the hearing impaired population in the private sector. NCAD was founded in 1983 for state commissions, and in 1987 membership was extended to non-profit service agencies.

The major benefits of membership are information sharing and a biennial convention. Our first convention was held in Austin, Texas last April with at least fifty administrators and representatives from more than 17 states participating. Topics included management training and aspects of funding. Participants also gained information from interaction and sharing. The next convention is scheduled for Louisville, Kentucky, in May, 1990.

NCAD Bylaws define membership eligibility as follows: "State government or non-profit private agencies whose established primary function focuses on the provision of human services affecting hearing-impaired citizens are eligible for membership. Such human services may include advocacy, information and referral, interpreting services, TDD message relay, etc."

If you are interested and your agency meets the eligibility requirements, please fill out the enclosed application and send a check. The annual membership dues by calendar year are \$50 for agencies with less than full time (FTE) employees and \$100 for agencies with ten or more. Because this is the first time we are collecting dues, initial membership will be good until December 31, 1990 and renewable annually thereafter.



## HISTORY...

The development of community service programs for the deaf and hearing impaired go back to the late 50's and early 60's. Then along came the establishment of state commissions and councils for deaffhearing impaired in the early 70's which continues to this day.

Probably the oldest commission for the deat is the Division for the Deaf and Deafened in Michigan which was established in 1930. There were probably some local community services for the deaf available during the postwar years but they were composed of volunteers and family interpreters.

Due to these developments, the National Council of State Agencies was born in 1983 after many meetings of key commission/council directors. The idea behind this entity was to foster exchange of information and develop data bases among such agencies.

Realizing that the number of such state agencies was too small for an operational national plan, the NCSAD, as it was then called, changed its name and amended its yellaw, to include independent community service centers for the deaf in 1988 at its first ever National Convention in Austin, Texas.

With this name change, the organization is now known as the National Council of Agencies on Deafness.

Motioned by Bill Peace (R. Herring) to delete "directors" from the bylaws. Carried.

Motioned by Bill Peace (C. Roberts) to reduce quorum from 80% to 50% (Article V. Sec. 6(a). Carried.

Eloise Lietzow brought attention to Article 6, Sec 4, C.

regarding expenses for representatives. Peace suggested that the Executive Committee develops a Policy.

Lietzow suggested correction on Page 5, Sec 1 to read Chairperson, not President.

Lietzow questioned about term of office on Page 6, section 10. There is no indication of length of office term. The membership agreed to change from annual to two years beginning July, 1984.

Motioned by Pickell to hold elections biennally during odd numbered years (Page 7, Art. III, Sec. 1). Carried.

Motioned by McKinner to change Art. X on dissolution to add as follows: If the National Council should be dissolved, its remaining assets shall be disbursed to a non-Profit organization serving hearing impaired under the Internal Revenue Sercice Code (1954-Tax Exempt Status 501-C-3). Carried.

The Council discussed about election. Should it be concurrent with ADARA election year? Peace suggested to leave it to one year due to early stages of development of the organization. Rogers suggested that we need to have Position on Justifying organizations to attend meetings.MOTIONET by Cook (Roberts) to elect officers every two years. (Amend Art 6, Sec 10). Carried.

The Council voted to accept the Bylaws as revised.

The Council voted to affiliate with the American Deafness and Rehabilitation Association after lengthy discussion. The Council discussed at a length of time on dues. Nine council members voted for \$50.00 and only one voted for \$10.00. Its hereby official that \$50 dues will be assessed to each agency who wishes to become member of the National Council. The Executive Board will work with Sharon Carter, Executive Director of American Deafness and Rehabilitation Association to develop bookkeeping and billing Procedures.

The following officiers were elected: ChairPerson--Bill Peace; Vice-ChairPerson--Chris Hunter; Secretary-Treasurer--Lily Bess.

The meeting was adjourned until 1985 ADARA conference.
